### Speakers

**Pamela Bates** is the Senior Officer for Asia in the Office of Science and Technology Cooperation at the US Department of State. She is responsible for managing bilateral and multilateral cooperative projects between the US and countries in the East Asia Pacific region. A career foreign service officer, Ms. Bates was previously the telecommunications and IT officer for the East Asia Pacific region. She has also served as the Italy desk officer, the regional policy officer for the former Soviet Union, a politico-military affairs officer in Bonn, Germany, as a staff member of the NATO affairs office and as an economic officer in Brazil. Ms. Bates holds a Master's degree in international affairs from Johns Hopkins, SAIS and an MBA from the Wharton School. In 1993, while serving as the US exchange diplomat to the Brazilian Ministry of External Relations, she attended the Ministry's Rio Branco Academy. She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

**William A. Blanpied** is a Senior Research Scholar in the Science and Trade Policy Program (STPP) at George Mason University School of Law. Prior to his retirement from the federal government in January 2003 he had been, since 1983, Senior International Analyst at the National Science Foundation (NSF), except for the period from July 1999 through August 2002 when he served as Director of the NSF Tokyo Regional Office in the US Embassy. From January 1999 to the present, he has been a principal point of contact in the United States for organizing an approximately annual series of Sino-US Science Policy Dialogues, funded in part by NSF and implemented through the STTP program. He also currently serves as a Senior Advisor to the Global Emerging Technologies Institute (GETI). Prior to his service with NSF, he held faculty appointments in the physics departments at Case Western Reserve, Yale, and Harvard Universities, where his research interests were in experimental particle physics. While at Harvard, he established and served as first editor of an international newsletter that has since evolved into the quarterly journal, *Science, Technology and Human Values*. Dr. Blanpied received his B.S. degree from Yale University in 1955 and his Ph.D. in physics from Princeton University in 1959.

**David Kahaner** is founding director of the Asian Technology Information Program (ATIP). He was formerly the Associate Director of the US Office of Naval Research Asia (ONR). Since 1979 he has also been co-employed at the US National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST). Dr. Kahaner has been examining information-rich technologies in Asia since the 1980s. His analyses are circulated worldwide to thousands in industry, government, and academia. They are reprinted in many journals as well as often quoted in major news media, and he consults and lectures frequently on those topics both in and outside of the

region. In 1993 he was awarded the title of "Mr. Asia" by *Computerworld*. He was the Asian Chair for Supercomputing 90-94 and is the International Relations Chair for Supercomputing 95. He was the originator and one of the organizers of the first HPC-Asia, held in Taipei in September 1995. Dr. Kahaner is the author of two well-known books and more than 50 refereed research papers. He obtained his Ph.D. in applied mathematics from Stevens Institute of Technology in 1968.

**Robin H. "Sak" Sakoda** is a Partner with Armitage International, L.C. since the company was established in March 2005. He had previously served as Executive Assistant to the Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage from December 2002 through January 2005. Prior to this, he headed Sakoda Associates as well as being a Senior Associate with Armitage Associates after retiring from U.S. Government service in February 1999. At the Pentagon, he served as Country Director for Japan, Asian and Pacific Affairs in the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) from June 1994 to February 1999. Mr. Sakoda was a foreign area officer and studied Japanese language at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California and the Foreign Service Institute in Yokohama, Japan. He received his M.A. in National Security Affairs from the Naval Postgraduate School in June 1988. Upon completing language studies in Yokohama, he served as aide-de-camp to the Commanding General, US Army Japan/IX Corps in 1989. Mr. Sakoda completed Airborne and Ranger schools; the Japan Ground Self-Defense Force Command and Staff College in Ichigaya, Tokyo; and the US Army Command and Staff College. Mr. Sakoda graduated from The Military College of South Carolina, The Citadel and was commissioned in the Infantry in May 1978.
